

## Think Big and Be Open to All Options

- Apply everywhere-it's all remote
- Be open to contract, full time and contract to
- Be open on salary and rate-no cost of gas or commute time involved
- Be open to options. Don't say NO-Listen!
- Be nice to recruiters!!! We advocate for you.
- Track where you apply & avoid double submittal

## **Get Ready For Your Closeup**

- Be prepared for all virtual platforms-there are many and some have odd interfaces
- Check for lighting & full face and head visual
- Check your background-clean/uncluttered.
- Test out your platform with a friend
- Dress for the interview--not too casual
- Be in a place with no distractions.
   Doors/windows closed and your cell phone turned off. Sit up straight and smile
- Look at the camera-not your image on the PC

## Make New Friends and Keep the Old

- Attend Zoom meetings esp. the networking
- Have a brief intro when you meet new people
- Schedule "virtual water cooler talks". Invite
  2-3 people. Have them invite other new people
- Reach out to your alumni associations
- Attend local Chamber of Commerce meetings
- Post articles on LinkedIn. Comment on posts
- Volunteer for a non-profit. Grow your network
- Let your family/friends/ former colleagues know that you are "available"

## **Use Your Ingenuity** and **Stay Focused**

- Have a schedule and stick to it
- Exercise- keeps you in good mental health.
   Sierra Club and neighborhood walks will expand your network
- Listen to/Read motivational podcasts and books They keep you in a "good place"
- Volunteering is a great way to network, fill your schedule and a great talking point for interviews. Nothing political!
- Try new ideas-what is the worst that can happen?

#### BE PREPARED

Be able to articulate your experience

I often hear clients say about candidates after interviews "They could not tell me about their projects. They could not explain things"

Create a word document with your elevator pitch and answers to commonly asked questions and practice it.

Do more than just a 3 minute elevator pitch. Write out solid answers for many questions and practice saying them

Stay motivated. Listen or read motivational books and podcasts. Try Tony Robbins and Brian Tracey

Go to the library and pick up books or download books/podcasts from Hoopla, Amazon Prime and other free sites. You don't have to read/listen to the entire book or podcast but 15-20 minutes per day will help to keep you in a good frame of mind.

Be open and flexible and listen



Network and be prepared for the interview



Stay focused and consistent
